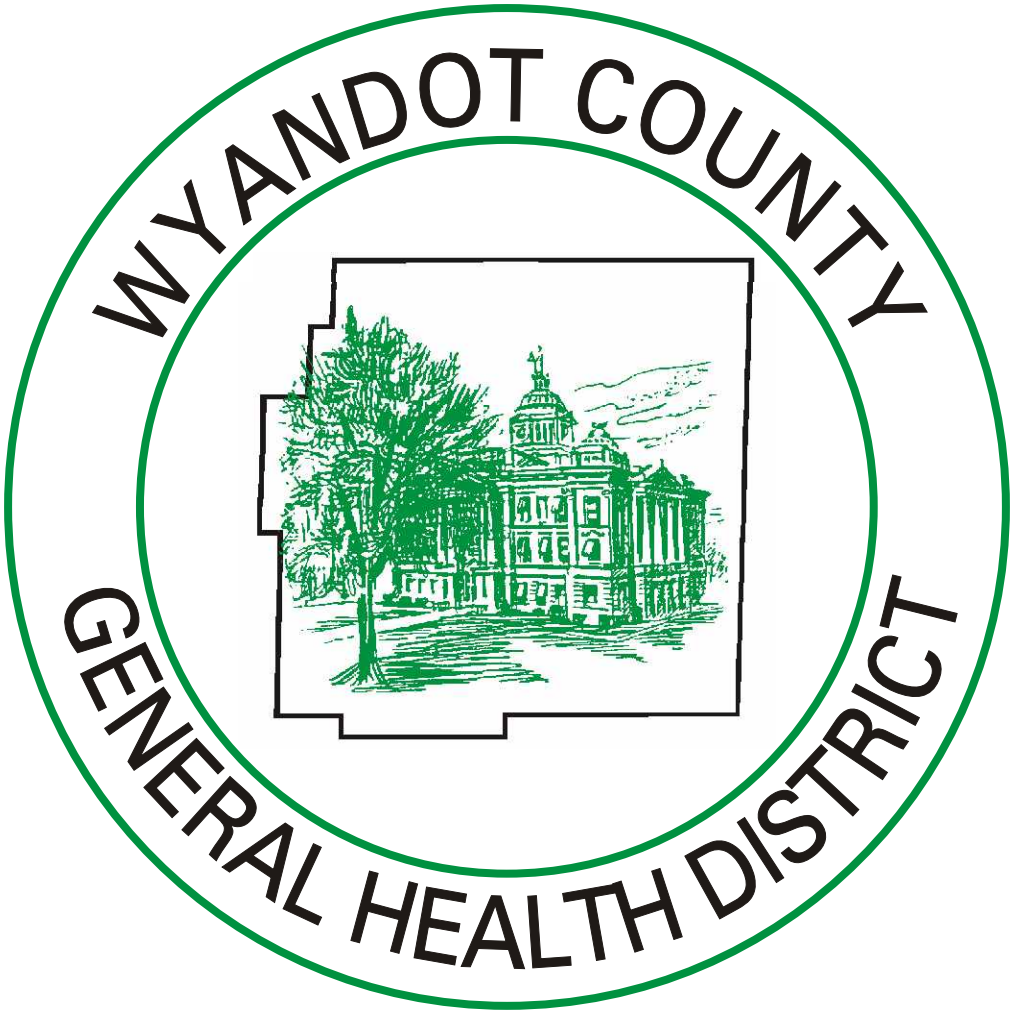

# 2011 Environmental Report

## Environmental Health Division

The Wyandot County Health District is responsible for conducting inspection activities related to state mandated environmental health programs. These programs include the licensing and inspection of food services, home sewage treatment systems, private water systems, campgrounds, manufactured home parks, public pools, tattoo and body piercing operations and solid waste facilities. The Department also inspects schools, investigates animal bites, public health nuisance complaints, smoke-free workplace complaints and conducts animal and vector borne disease testing and surveillance. Some of the significant highlights from 2011 are listed below.

## Sewage Program

In 2011 the Wyandot County Commissioners, in cooperation with the Wyandot County Health District and Sandusky River Watershed Partnership, applied for and received a grant to assist qualifying households with replacing their failing household sewage treatment systems. The grant is being funded through the Ohio EPA "Water Pollution Control Loan Fund Principal Forgiveness Program" and will allow for an estimated five complete system replacements for qualifying homeowners. The goal of this program is to make the replacement of failing systems more affordable for low income families and ultimately reduce water pollution caused by a failing system. Applications for the program are first come first serve, and can be applied for through the summer of 2012. Individuals interested in participating in the program can contact the Health Department for specific program details and applications.

## Tattoo and Body Piercing Program

Recently the Wyandot County Health District Issued our first ever approval to operate a tattooing establishment in Wyandot County. In order to obtain approval, the operator was required to provide the Health Department with facility plans showing the type and location of all required equipment, provide copies of required training certifications for all tattoo artists, and provide copies of written procedures related to tattoo after care procedures as well as the required paperwork necessary to obtain approval to tattoo minors. The Health Department will inspect this and any future operations regularly to assure compliance with the State's standards for tattoo establishments.



## Private Water System Program

The private water system rules recently went through revisions in accordance with the State's five year rule review process. The most significant changes made were the addition of permit categories, required notifications to contractors, and the types of water samples required for private water system approval. Based upon the changes made, the Department spent a considerable amount of time developing fact sheets, working with private water system contractors, and educating homeowners regarding the new requirements. The biggest issue affecting homeowners is the change in water quality testing. Under the old rules, the Health Department assessed water quality using a pass or fail test, meaning the presence of any bacteria in a sample resulted in a failure of the water system to meet the minimum bacterial standard. Under the new requirements, water quality is assessed by the number of colonies of bacteria present. Based upon the new standards, private water systems are acceptable as long as there are less than four colonies of

bacteria present, with no indication of e-coli. It is thought that the use of colony counts instead of a strict pass/fail testing will benefit both the homeowner and health department with assessing potential issues associated with the development of new and altered private water systems.

## Radon Program

Last year, with the assistance of a grant from the Ohio Department of Health, our department provided over 170 free radon test kits to Wyandot County citizens. Because radon is an odorless, colorless, and tasteless naturally occurring gas, testing is the only way to know if a home contains elevated levels. Surprisingly, out of 567 radon tests performed to-date in Wyandot County, approximately 45% of the results have shown indoor radon levels above 4pCi/L, which is the EPA's established action level. When elevated levels of radon are identified, they can often be addressed by a homeowner for as little as \$500. There are also radon mitigation professionals in the area that could be contracted to address any problems.

## Public Health Emergency Preparedness

Plan, Prepare, and Respond continued to reflect the Health District's emergency response activities in 2011. One of our major accomplishments last year was the major overhaul of our Mass Vaccination and Prophylaxis Annex, as well as the completion of a functional exercise to test the changes made. The Mass Vaccination and Prophylaxis Annex is the primary planning document outlining the distribution of medication to the public during a disaster. In addition to our planning activity, the Department also coordinated over a dozen Wyandot County Medical Reserve Corp activities during the year. These activities included MRC members volunteering at local health fairs, at emergency shelters and participating in local meetings and trainings.

## Environmental Health Outreach Activities

Throughout 2011, the Environmental Health Division provided a host of educational outreach activities to our citizens. These activities included providing emergency planning and food safety presentations in schools, publishing health and safety related articles in local newspapers, and regularly updating public health messages on our website and Facebook page. New outreach campaigns included "Are you prepared?" for a zombie apocalypse, which is an expansion of a Centers for Disease Control media campaign. This outreach activity emphasized that if your family is ready for a zombie attack, then they are ready for most disasters. Cooperation with local schools and grocery stores expanded this campaign out into the community. The Department also participated with our local regional planning agency and other community partners to develop and present a "Before You Build Workshop". This workshop guides prospective home builders through the hurdles of building a new home in Wyandot County. As always, the Environmental Health Division is ready and willing to provide local groups and the general public with presentations on environmental health topics.





# 2011 Public Health Nursing

## HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR IN NURSING

**Communicable Disease Reporting** - Public health nurses are responsible for following state mandated requirements for ODRS (Ohio Disease Reporting System). During 2011 we had 105 confirmed cases of communicable diseases that were reported and case investigation completed. An additional 22 cases were reported and after investigation were found not to be a case or transferred to another county. The most commonly reported infectious diseases in Wyandot County were Chlamydia, Varicella and Campylobacteriosis.

**Immunizations** - Wyandot County Health Department continues to be the primary administrator of vaccines for our residents. Immunizations are available for children, teens, and adults to help in our fight to eliminate vaccine preventable diseases. Vaccines and their recommendations are continuously changing. Our immunization staff remains up to date with these changes by following ACIP guidelines to provide accurate, consistent vaccine education to the general public and the medical community. Through collaboration with ODH and pharmaceutical companies we offer low cost vaccines to eligible adult clients.

**BCMh** - BCMH (Bureau for Children with Medical Handicaps) is a program funded through Ohio Department of Health assisting parents with their child's special health care needs. Three (3) Registered Nurses provide services to children Birth-21 years of age who meet eligibility requirements. BCMH consists of two parts. Part one is the *Diagnostic Program* where a PHN refers a child to a BCMH provider to receive diagnostic testing to confirm a medical condition. Part two is the *Treatment Program* where the child can receive treatment of an eligible condition. Both medical and financial eligibility are required for the *Treatment Program*. During 2011, 82 BCMH children were active; 59 on treatment plan; 17 on diagnostic services; 3 on service coordination; and 3 on HMG/PHN coordination.

**School Nursing** - Angeline, Carey, Mohawk (hearing only), Our Lady of Consolation, St. Peter's and Upper Sandusky school districts contract with the Wyandot County Health Department for school nurse services. School nurses are an integral part of health promotion within the school community. School nurses monitor students' immunization status, complete hearing, vision and scoliosis screening all with guidance from the Ohio Department of Health. The school nurses provide medication administration and Bloodborne Pathogen training to school staff. Human growth and development, dental, nutrition, handwashing and tobacco prevention programs are presented to select grade levels. Parents are contacted by the nurse for consults and referrals. The nurses provide health services and guidance to students, parents and staff members related to chronic health conditions such as diabetes, cerebral palsy, and spina bifida. Providing guidance to school administration and staff related to a variety of health issues is a vital part of the nurse's role.

## GRANTS

**CFHS** - The CFHS (Child Family Health Services) grant focuses on elimination of health disparities, improve birth outcomes, and improve the health status of women, infants and children. BMI statistics from 2009 reported 39.3% Wyandot County 3<sup>rd</sup> graders were overweight. During 2011, we focused on reducing the percentage of children who are overweight through implementation of nutrition education classes to preschoolers and 2<sup>nd</sup> graders. In our efforts to help reduce the rate of infant mortality, we provided *Safe Sleep Messages* at several community events and developed educational packets presented for new parents through Wyandot Memorial Hospital's OB Unit. This grant also provided funding to begin planning for the 2012 Community Health Assessment.

**RHWP** - The RHWP (Reproductive Health & Wellness Program) grant partially funds our Family Planning Clinic. A portion of these monies are provided through the federal TITLE X program. This program provides access to low-cost physical exams, cancer screening, STD testing and treatment, contraceptives and HIV counseling and testing to both women and men 13 years of age and older. Fees are based on client's income utilizing a sliding fee scale of 100% of the federal poverty guidelines. As of July 2011, we are required to bill private insurance companies for re-imbursement of services. The focus of this program is to improve birth outcomes in helping women get healthy before they become pregnant. All clients are educated on disease and pregnancy prevention, nutrition, exercise and healthy lifestyle choices.

**IAP** - The IAP (Immunization Action Plan) grant focuses on raising infant immunization rates so that children will be up-to-date by age 2 years. Our efforts include staff education, mailing parent's reminder and recalls for their child's vaccines, medical provider education and outreach activities in throughout the county. Our latest up-to-date rate was 67% in December. We will change our focus in 2012 highlighting the positive of timely vaccine administration and helping to eliminate erroneous media negativity associated with certain pediatric vaccines.

**Wyandot County Breast Health Initiative** - During 2011 the health department was among a number of projects chosen to receive funding from Susan G. Komen for the Cure Northwest Ohio. This new grant fund collaborates with Wyandot Memorial Hospital to provide access to free mammograms and/or breast ultrasounds for low to middle income women and men 19-64 years of age who are uninsured or underinsured residing in Wyandot, Crawford and Hardin Counties.

**Life Skills** - The Mental Health and Recovery Services Board of Seneca, Sandusky and Wyandot Counties provides funding for trained public health nurses to implement the Life Skills Training Program to approximately 475 students in grades 3-4-5 at OLC, St. Pete, East, South and Union Elementary. The focus of this program is to increase knowledge of dangers of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs and increase student's skills in rejecting peer pressure.

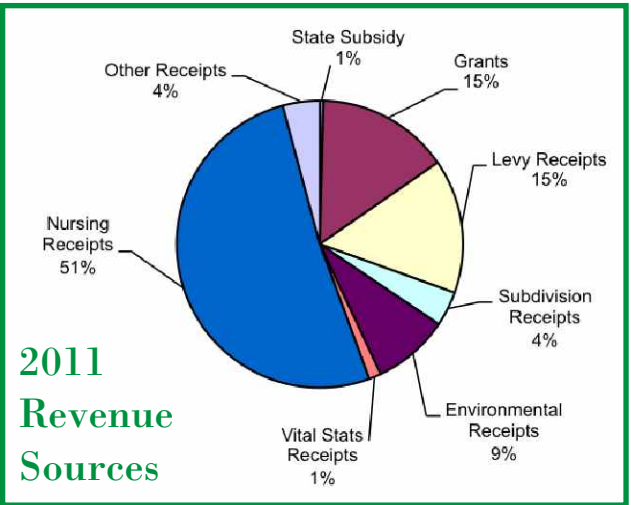

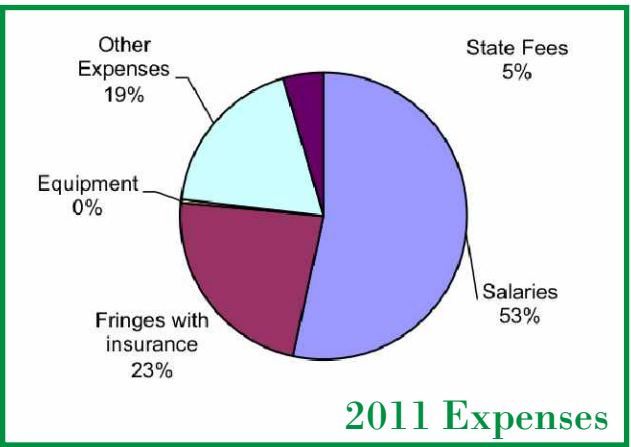

# Wyandot County WIC Program 2011

WIC is the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children. WIC works by providing nutrition education and specific foods to pregnant women, breastfeeding women, post-partum women, and children up to age 5. Breastfeeding is encouraged as the normal and healthiest feeding method for all babies. The Wyandot County WIC Program hosts a breastfeeding mothers sharing group the first Tuesday of every month at 11:00am. In 2011 an average of 568 Wyandot County residents were receiving WIC benefits each month.

WIC is funded through the United States Department of Agriculture. Approximately \$394,377 in federal tax dollars were returned to Wyandot County in food and assistance to WIC participants during 2011. Participants redeemed \$239,002 worth of WIC coupons at Wyandot County grocery stores. The WIC food package changed significantly October 1, 2010. Cheese and juice were eliminated from the WIC program and replaced with a fruit and vegetable voucher and a Whole grain component. These changes were made at the Federal level in an effort to minimize the increase in childhood obesity. WIC staff also passed out 89 sets of Farmers' Market Nutrition Program coupons worth \$15.00 per set. These coupons were redeemed at eligible farm markets and farm stands in Wyandot County. USDA, through the Ohio Department of Health, provided \$154,040 in grant funds to meet the expenses of administering the WIC program to Wyandot County residents.

The Wyandot County WIC staff works closely with many partnering agencies to insure that WIC participants are receiving the services they need to promote healthy life styles

for their families. We refer participants to Immunization Clinics, lead screening, car seat program, Help Me Grow, BCMH, Department of Job and Family Services, Head Start, OSU Extension, voter registration, and many other agencies. In 2011, WIC began testing eligible participants for lead during their scheduled appointments. 129 eligible children had their lead tested in 2011. Public health staff nurses are available during all WIC clinic hours to insure that participants are up to date with immunizations.

WIC Services are available Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday at the Wyandot County Health Department. Evening and lunch hours are available by appointment. Upper income limits for the WIC Program are generous and increase with family size. Potential participants qualifying for Medicaid qualify for WIC. Funding is provided to serve all eligible participants. WIC serves traditional as well as non-traditional families. Translators are available for Spanish speaking participants.

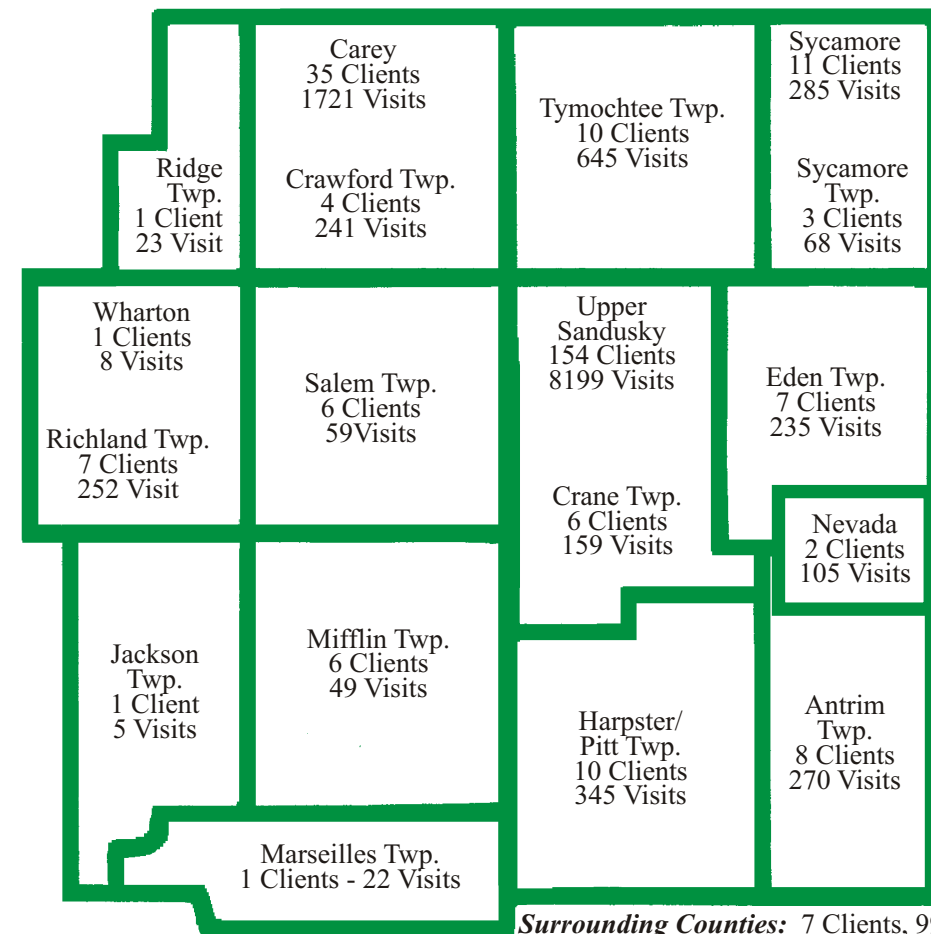
*Certified copies are issued at \$25.00 each, of which \$3.00 is submitted to the State of Ohio for the "Prevention of Child Abuse/Child Neglect" program and \$1.50 is submitted to the State of Ohio for the "Family Violence Prevention" program. Also, \$5.00 of each certificate will be used solely toward the modernization and automation of the system of vital records in Ohio.*
