In August of 2002, more than 20 local agencies, businesses, health professionals, and private citizens established the Wyandot County Health Alliance, a partnership to improve community wellness and quality of life. In 2003, with "A Healthier Wyandot County" as their vision, the Health Alliance initiated the most comprehensive county-wide, standardized community needs assessment ever conducted for Wyandot County. The assessment is completed every three years, as required by the Ohio Department of Health. In 2022, we utilized the data from the 2021 Community Health Assessment (CHA) to create our 2022-2025 Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP). To view the specific


The Fiscal Division administers all state, federal, and local grants, oversees the collection of revenues and monitors expenses, payroll and purchasing. The Health District is audited once a year by the Auditor of the State of Ohio and has received a clean audit for many years. In addition to the state audit, the Board of Health Fiscal Committee meets twice annually. This committee is comprised of three members of the Board of Health and the Administrator.

### 2022 Environmental Health Report of Activities

The Environmental Health Division's duties include conducting environmental health inspections at restaurants and other food service establishments as well as campgrounds, swimming pools, landfills, and school facilities. Additional responsibilities include issuing water and sewage permits for private residences and overseeing the operation and maintenance of septic systems in the county. The Environmental Health Division is also involved in tracking all animal bites and assuring animals are quarantined and vaccinated for rabies.











### **Environmental Health Performance Management**

In 2022 the Environmental Health Division continued to monitor positive water sample rates for new and replaced private water systems. The goal of this project is to reduce the costs and inconvenience associated with the resampling of wells for homeowners, contractors and the Health Department, and to assure safe water for homeowners.





Since 2017 Wyandot Public
Health has continued to add
both new and old household
sewage treatment systems into
an Operational Permitting
Program. Operational Permits
help to assure that septic systems
are being properly maintained
and are not creating nuisances.

The cost to replace or repair a failing sewage system can be devastating to a homeowner. To assist with the financial burden, Wyandot County Public Health continues to make grant dollars available each year to income eligible families for the repair or replace-ment of failing household sewage systems.

### Deer Ticks, a Potential Emerging Health Issue



In 2022 Wyandot County Public Health confirmed the first black-legged ticks, better known as deer ticks, in southeast Wyandot County. Unlike the American dog ticks typically seen in the spring and summer, deer ticks are primarily active in the spring, fall and winter.

Finding deer ticks is significant because they are the main carrier of lyme disease, the most common vector-borne disease in the United States. Lyme disease can affect your joints,

nervous system, heart, skin, and eyes. The best way to prevent Lyme disease is to be aware of areas where ticks are found, check yourself and your pets for ticks often after walking in wooded areas, and when bitten by a tick, quickly removing them. Once the tick is removed, individuals are encouraged to submit ticks to the health department for identification, and to obtain additional information regarding tick borne diseases in Ohio.

### 2022 WIC Report of Activities

### An exciting year of change for WIC!

- 1. On April 5th, we were excited to welcome participants into the office for their appointments as we transitioned back to in-person visits!
- 2. Transitioning back to in-person visits has allowed us to check hemoglobin (iron) levels for all of our participants. Low iron in infancy and early childhood can lead to slow growth, impaired brain development, and fatigue. We check iron levels during pregnancy and at least once per year during childhood to ensure our children are getting the care they need to avoid any complications.
- 3. Our new Health Assistant, Hanna Dickerson, started on January 14th and has been an excellent addition to our WIC team!
- 4. Our director of seven years, Arlene Schriner, RD, LD, retired from our program on June 2nd and we welcomed our new director, Krystina Auble, MPH, RD, LD, CLC, at the same time.
- Due to the formula shortage that started in March 2022, State WIC put waivers in place to allow our WIC parents the flexibility to purchase different brands of formula. Thankfully, the formula shortage has improved throughout 2022 and we hope that improvement will continue in 2023.

WIC is a nutrition program that provides assistance for mothers and families who qualify by offering nutrition evaluation and education, breastfeeding education and support, highly nutritious supplemental foods and iron fortified formula if necessary. These promote good health for pregnant

and postpartum women, infants, and children up to age five. We work closely with partnering agencies and refer participants to other community service providers in the county for unmet needs.



## WIC Quality Improvement Project



Wyandot County WIC has increased our breastfeeding initiation rate from 56% in January 2022 to 66.7% in December 2022, an increase of 10.7%! We are proud to report that we are also now above the average Ohio WIC breastfeeding initiation rate of 63.8%. We look forward to continuing to support our WIC parents in their breastfeeding journeys in 2023!

### **COVID-19 Response**



During 2022 Wyandot County Public Health continued response efforts to the COVID-19 Pandemic. This included the identification of an additional 2,265 COVID cases, 45% of which occurred in the month of January. Additionally, the health department distributed roughly 3,000 home test kits, continued community health education and outreach efforts, and administered 1,353 COVID vaccinations to local residents.
