In August of 2002, more than 20 local agencies, businesses, health professionals, and private citizens established the Wvandot County Health Alliance, a partnership to improve community wellness and quality of life. In 2003, with "A Healthier Wvandot County" as their vision, the Health Alliance initiated the most comprehensive county-wide, standardized community needs assessment ever conducted for Wvandot County. The assessment is completed every three years, as required by the Ohio Department of Health. In 2022, we utilized the data from the 2021 Community Health Assessment (CHA) to create our 2022-2025 **Community Health Improvement** Plan (CHIP). 



2024 Environmental Health Report of Activities

The Environmental Health Division's duties include conducting environmental health inspections at restaurants and other food service establishments as well as campgrounds, swimming pools, landfills, and school facilities. Additional responsibilities include issuing water and sewage permits for private residences and overseeing the operation and maintenance of septic systems in the county. The Environmental Health Division is also involved in tracking all animal bites and assuring animals are quarantined and vaccinated for rabies.











In 2024 the Environmental Health Division continued to monitor positive water sample rates for new and replaced private water systems. The ultimate goal of this project is to reduce the costs and inconvenience associated with the resampling of wells for homeowners, contractors and the Health Department, and to assure safe water for homeowners.





Since 2017 Wyandot Public Health has added old existing sewage systems as well as new installs into an Operational Permitting Program. Operational Permits help to ensure that existing septic systems are being properly maintained and not creating nuisances. The cost to replace or repair a failing sewage system can be devastating to a household. To assist with the financial burden, Wyandot Public Health continues to make available up to \$75,000 in grant dollars each year, to income eligible families, for the repair or replacement of failing household sewage systems.

2024 WIC Report of Activities

Another fantastic year for WIC!

- 1. Wyandot WIC has continued to grow our caseload over the past year—increasing from 322 participants in January to 367 participants in December, an increase of 14%!
- 2. The USDA released WIC's new food rules in April 2024. Most changes won't occur until 2026 but immediately increased the fruit and vegetable benefit permanently! Pregnant and breastfeeding participants receive \$52 per month, postpartum participants receive \$47 per month and children ages 1 through 4 receive \$26 per month with an expected increase each year due to inflation. This permanent increase is imperative for our WIC participants to consume adequate amounts of fresh fruits and vegetables each day.
- 3. Wyandot WIC participated in the Farmer's Market program for the second year in a row and gave out \$30 worth of produce to 100 Wyandot WIC participants last summer!
- 4. We partnered with Help Me Grow to throw our second baby shower in August for expecting parents and parents with children under one we hope to continue this tradition each year!

Women, Infants, and Children Program (WIC)

WIC is a nutrition program that provides assistance for mothers and families who qualify by offering nutrition evaluation and education, breastfeeding education and support, highly nutritious supple-mental foods and iron fortified formula if necessary. These promote good

health for pregnant and postpartum women, infants, and children up to age five. We work closely with partnering agencies and refer participants to other community service providers in the county for unmet needs.



WIC Quality Improvement Project




Wyandot County WIC has increased our breastfeeding initiation rate from an average of 67% in 2023 to 83% in 2024, an increase of 16%! This compares to the state's average WIC breastfeeding initiation rate of 67%. Wyandot County WIC has the highest initiation rate of all WIC projects in Ohio. We look forward to continuing to support our WIC parents in their breastfeeding journeys in 2025!

Communicable Diseases In Wyandot County



Notes:

- Case counts include confirmed, probable, and suspect disease classifications. Suspected cases of COVID-19 are excluded.
- Sexually transmitted infections include chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis
- Vector-borne diseases include Lyme disease and West Nile virus disease



- Enteric illnesses include campylobacteriosis, cryptosporidiosis, E. coli, giardiasis, salmonella, shigellosis, and yersiniosis. Vaccine-preventable illnesses include Haemophilus influenzae, Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, influenzaassociated hospitalizations, and Streptococcus pneumoniae
- Bloodborne pathogens include Hepatitis C
- Other illnesses include CPO, Legionnaires' disease, bacterial meningitis, and streptococcal disease

2024 Harm Reduction Machines

- July 17, 2024: The Wyandot County Board of Health approved the purchase of three harm reduction machines via utilization of grant funds.
- **December 5, 2024:** The ribbon cutting ceremony introduced harm reduction machines into the community.

These machines are located outside

- 1. Wyandot Medical Providers at Carey
- 2. Wyandot Memorial Hospital's Urgent Care and Koehler Pharmacy
- 3. Wyandot Memorial Hospital Emergency Room

Partnerships that made these machines possible

- Wyandot Memorial Hospital for providing the locations and supplying electricity for the machines
- Wyandot County Prevention provides Deterra Drug Deactivation bags
- The Ohio Department of Health is providing the COVID-19 at-home test kits

- Project DAWN though ODH is providing the Naloxone
- Gallion City Health Department is providing condoms and safe sex information
- Wyandot County Public Health is maintaining the machines

Narcan kits distributed

- **182** kits were distributed in 2023
- **686** kits were distributed in 2024
- 1,260 Have been distributed through the Route 30 ODOT vending machines in 2024
